Ann is a Jungian analyst practicing in New York City, Professor Emerita in Psychology and Religion at Union Theological Seminary, member of the Jungian Psychoanalytic Association and the Editorial Advisory Board of the Journal of Analytical Psychology. She lectures here and abroad. She has authored many books with her late husband Barry Ulanov, including *The Envied and the Envying: Cinderella and Her Sisters*, and *The Healing Imagination*, as well as many books of her own, including, *Madness & Creativity; The Psychoid, Soul and Psyche Piercing Space/Time Barriers; Back to Basics.*

Jim Kline received his PhD in psychology with a Jungian Studies specialization from Saybrook University, San Francisco, California. He currently works in the Social Sciences and Fine Arts Department of Northern Marianas College and serves as professor of psychology. David is in private clinical practice in Santa Fe, New Mexico.



Arts of the Imaginal World: Rejuvenation & Psychic Creativity Susan Rowland, PhD January 17 & 18, 2025

Susan is the author of books on Jung, gender and the arts including Jung: A Feminist Revision (2002) and with Joel Weishaus, Jungian Arts-Based Research and the Nuclear Enchantment of New Mexico (2021). She teaches creative practices with psychic images at Pacifica Graduate Institute, California. She uses Jungian art practice to explore feminine heroism, trauma, and the climate emergency through writing the Mary Wandwalker mystery series: The Sacred Well Murders (2022) followed by The Alchemy Fire Murder in 2023, linking alchemy, America and wildfires. Murder on Family Grounds was published in 2024 with The Swan Lake Murders due in 2025.

Gary is a 1982 diploma graduate of the C. G. Jung Institute-Zürich. Our history

In the early 1970s, an era of emerging social consciousness and individual exploration, fifty people responded to an ad placed by our founder, Dottie Kyle, in a small local newspaper, *The Lake Oswego Review*. They gathered under a shade tree in her backyard to share ideas about Jungian psychology. They were hungry for discussion and community. Out of this gathering of seekers, Oregon Friends of Jung was born.

Before long, those early OFJ members began inviting leading Jungians to Portland as a way of nourishing themselves and serving the community. Programs with Joseph Campbell, James Hillman, Edward Edinger, Joseph Wheelwright, Marion Woodman, Thomas Moore, and Robert Johnson attracted attendees from around the state and beyond.

Now in our 50th year, Oregon Friends of Jung is a 300-member volunteerdriven 501(c)(3) non-profit educational organization, with an Executive Director and passionate Board. We remain conscious of the vision of our founders: to serve our community humbly and with few organizational trappings, offering serious Jungian discourse to individuals who are searching for consciousness and meaning in their personal lives and in the world.

The Symbolic Life: Is It a Gift?

Two processes go on in us simultaneously from birth until death. The first is a personal process Jung calls individuation where we reach to become all of who we are, including mistakes, struggles, unique talentsthose shared human patterns Jung calls archetypes. The second process is the psyche's goal to move us toward finding not our wholeness but our place in the wholeness of reality. When these two processes meet, symbols get born and grow powerful. We explore such symbols-their dangers and their gifts.

Uncertainty: Is It a Gift?

What a disturbing title! Some days we feel foundations we have relied upon are upended; some nights we fear what can we depend on. Can we trust that truth is accessible and real? How do we discern the archetypal power in the midst of personal experience? We take up the gifts psyche offers in the midst of uncertainty by exploring the recall and integration of projections, locality, naming, and new forms of communication that result from placement of the ego, and that provide a new way to be liberated from a dogging complex. Psyche responds to uncertainty with creative gestures.

The Appeal of the Extraordinary JIM KLINE, PHD

A universal human desire is to be drawn to extraordinary beliefs and strange phenomena that defy rational explanation. C.G. Jung might consider the appeal of the extraordinary as evidence of the archaic or archetypal thought and behavioral patterns inherent in the human psyche and in humanity's collective unconscious. The archetypal dimension expresses significant symbolic and metaphorical concepts that cannot be proven by rational methods, such as the concept of God. Often, the desire to embrace extraordinary views and phenomena have dire consequences if a person insists upon an extraordinary explanation rather than a rational one to explain certain factual events, and interprets purely secular causes as imbued with an underlying divine significance. We are introduced to examples of how the appeal of the extraordinary can enrich our lives and also distort reality.

Jung's psychology provides techniques to keep individuals in touch with their inner lives, as well as methods for interpreting the nonrational, archetypal aspects of the unconscious. We explore these techniques and insights that we need now to detect and respect the nonrational elements within life that inspire, intimidate, confuse, and ultimately compel us to confront the intimations of the archaic basis of the mind. We delve into otherworldly beliefs as a way to better understand the origins of archetypal thought patterns, and consider how these beliefs continue to inspire us through our dreams and extraordinary experiences.

Those who cannot perform normative cultural narratives often find their voices silenced. Queer Theory offers us a new framework for working with old material. To queer an experience is to resist defining it. Queerness may provide a place to stand within oneself while also standing in the energy of an Exile complex that can be embraced as a new path towards individuation. We will explore the connections to be made between Queer Theory and Jungian concepts of Individuation, Complex Theory, Weltanschauung, and Active Imagination.

Queering the Path: Working with Images in Psyche through the Lens of a Queer Analytic Attitude

In this experiential day of reflection and group process we work towards a synthesis of material from Queer Theory and Analytic Psychology and apply this synthesis to clinical material, working with fairy tale material from a Queer Energy perspective. In these tales we will encounter images of Jouissance, Exile, the Death Drive, the costs of Kinship Libido, and the phenomenological necessity of finding an embodied Home.
